RURAL JUSTICE COLLABORATIVE

Rural communities face unique challenges that impact their ability to deliver fair and equitable justice. Despite these challenges, rural communities rely on their many strengths to address the needs of their residents.

The National Center for State Courts, in partnership with Rulo Strategies, launched the <u>Rural</u> Justice Collaborative (RJC) to showcase the strengths of rural communities and highlight the cross-sector collaboration that is a hallmark of rural justice systems.

The work under the RJC is supported by a cross-sector advisory council composed of rural judges along with additional stakeholders in the justice, child welfare, and behavioral health systems. The advisory council guides and identifies innovative programs and practices.

AMBULANCE DESERTS: GEOGRAPHIC DISPARITIES IN THE PROVISION OF AMBULANCE SERVICES

Access to timely ambulance service is essential to the emergency medical system. Yet ambulance access varies widely, with significant gaps across the country. This study documents coverage gaps in the provision of ambulance services across the United States and its impact, particularly in remote rural areas.

RURAL/URBAN DIFFERENCES IN RATES AND PREDICTORS OF INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE AND ABUSE SCREENING AMONG PREGNANT AND POSTPARTUM U.S. RESIDENTS

Domestic violence, including intimate partner violence (IPV), is a leading non-obstetric cause of maternal morbidity and mortality. Violence during pregnancy is one of the most common health problems experienced by pregnant people, affecting a similar number of individuals each year as gestational diabetes. This research explores the differences between rural and urban rates and predictors of IVP. The study showed that rural residents were more likely than urban residents to experience physical violence from an intimate partner during pregnancy and childbirth across all sociodemographic and clinical characteristics examined.

IDENTIFYING MULTILEVEL COMMUNITY SUPERVISION CHALLENGES TO INFORM DIVERSION APPROACHES FOR PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESSES

This article reports on findings from qualitative interviews conducted as part of a larger, nationwide study of the perspectives of probation officers regarding their probation supervision approaches for individuals with mental illnesses. Twenty-six probation agency representatives from across the United States were interviewed with 50% (n=13) from mostly urban counties, 27% (n=7) from mostly rural counties, and 23% (n=6) from completely rural counties.

RECOVERY-FRIENDLY WORKPLACES CAN HELP THOSE ON THE PATH TO HEALING

Rural communities ravaged by substance misuse could benefit from people in recovery being active members of the local workforce, say experts in criminal justice, substance misuse, and labor studies. Recovery-friendly workplaces, also sometimes known as second-chance workplaces, allow people in recovery the opportunity to work. One example is <u>Black Sheep Brick Oven Bakery and</u> <u>Catering</u> in Jackhorn, Kentucky. <u>The restaurant</u> hires people who lost employment when coal production waned and folks emerging from incarceration created by the opioid crisis.

'PLANTING SEEDS OF CHANGE': IN RURAL COUNTIES, EXPANDING JAIL-BASED MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES IS A COMMUNITY EFFORT

In rural counties, where funding is often limited and community mental health resources may be scarce, providing comprehensive mental healthcare to people in jail and ensuring they can continue to access care after they are released can be incredibly challenging. However, rural communities may also have some unique strengths when assessing and addressing the mental health needs of incarcerated people. This article explores how rural counties use creativity and collaboration to make the most of limited resources.

BUILDING RECOVERY ECOSYSTEMS FOR SUBSTANCE USE TREATMENT

Robust recovery ecosystems provide an environment where individuals can access substance use treatment and recovery support services such as housing and second-chance employment. This webinar includes an overview of the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Recovery-to-Work Ecosystem Model to help individuals access the support services and training they need to recover and obtain gainful employment. VIOLENCE INTERVENTION PROGRAM TO EXPAND TO RURAL COUNTIES

"Just because some of these towns are smaller doesn't mean they aren't as impacted by violence," said Ashley Hink, M.D., Medical University of South Carolina Health trauma surgeon and medical director of the <u>Turning the Tide Violence Intervention Program (TTVIP</u>). MUSC Health is attempting something a little out of the box – taking a relatively new yet already proven program and expanding it to serve residents of some of the state's smaller counties.

AMERICAN BAR FOUNDATION'S ACCESS TO JUSTICE RESEARCHERS JOIN IN \$1 MILLION GRANT FROM THE NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION

Focused on addressing the growing access to justice crisis in the United States, the project will use evidence-based, community-driven strategies to scale and sustain the Alaska Legal Services Corporation's (ALSC's) non-lawyer Community Justice Worker (CJW) program throughout remote Alaska Native communities. The CJW program's goal is to develop a service delivery model that trains trusted, culturally representative community workers and others already embedded in rural and remote areas across Alaska to provide critical legal advocacy, hoping to replicate the model across the U.S. View a project summary video <u>here</u>.

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
